# Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

Egypt is a country with a population 105 million inhabitants and a birth rate of 2.9 which means that we have around 3 million children born each year; this means that around 35 thousand children with congenital heart disease are born yearly in Egypt; 50% of them will need intervention either surgically or by catheter; which is a big load on the health economy of Egypt. This has been aggravated by the recent 60% devaluation of the Egyptian pound. Therefore, our support is directly needed and is fundamental in this area, because the National Health Insurance cannot cover all children with congenial heart disease, so they die on the waiting list unless they receive help from sources such as ours.

The project will target the children who will need catheter intervention. We will be training young doctors and specialized nurses for the early detection and aftercare of these children as well as the non-invasive procedures by transferring specialized knowledge to the remote areas in Upper Egypt.

We have already completed three global grants phases 1-3 (GG 1986790 for 66700 USD and GG 2099800 for 98200 USD and GG 2128169 FOR 91800 USD ) treating total of 95 patients and training over 200 doctors and nurses in remote areas in Upper Egypt. The Egyptian economy is suffering very badly and health expenditure on congenital heart program was reduced as result of devaluation of Egyptian pound by 60% since March 2022. More and more patients are on the waiting lists all over Egypt. Phase IV plan to treat 28 children most of them from Upper Egypt where the need is maximum in Sohag and Beni Suef Governorates. We will also treat children in Alexandria in our Rotary fully funded and equipped hospitalwhich will further boost our Rotary image in Alexandria by adding sick children with heart defects to the beneficieries of this hospital. All patients are recruited from the hundreds of patients on waiting lists of the ministry of health for interventions. The main problem is that children with heart conditions can not afford to wait for too long. This project will help to save families in the process, by saving a child.

- 2- Aman El-Hayah Hospital in Beni suef is the biggest hospital in the city specialized in cardiac catheterizations. Our club has been involved with these hospitals over the past four years with great success.
- 3- Wadi El-Neel hospital is ranked hospital number one in Egypt with JCI (Joint Commission Accreditation) accredited three times in a row and the first hospital in Egypt to acquire JCI accreditation.

Our club has been involved with these hospitals over the past four years with great success in the previous three phases of project heart2Heart.

4- Anba Takla Hospital in Alexandria. This is a hospital completely equipped by Rotary Global Grants over the past ten years with all state of the art cardiac surgical and cardiac catheterisation suites. It was mainly treating adult patients. Recently it was also equipped to treat children with heart conditions. This is a complete Rotary funded project starting from the hospital ending by the child cured.

The 28 sick children catheterization procedures will be held in the above 4 hospitals in 4 Governerates North to South Egypt.

#### Describe the community needs that your project will address.

The National Health Insurance is not coping with the increasing numbers of children with congenial heart disease. As a result, they develop complications or die on the waiting list unless they receive help from NGOs such as Rotary Clubs. These long waiting lists of sick children families rely totally on NGO and donations to get their children treated with cardiac catheterization which is the gold standard method of treatment worldwide.

#### How did your project team identify these needs?

This is an ongoing project for four consecutive years. Volunteers from Rotary EL Tahrir; Host Club members frequently visit Cairo University Children Hospital, Sohag University Hospital, Beni Suef General Hospital and Alexandria Anba Takla hospitals (during Rotary health convoys) they also follow up the already treated children in phases I, II and III.

The Rotarian already have the old waiting lists of untreated children and not yet finished. They also interviewed the Patients on the endless waiting lists and their families and also the responsible doctors and nurses working in these hospitals. They found out that there are long lists of patients waiting for these procedures around 50-100 in each of the hospitals visited. These lists are extended as there are endless numbers of patients so they never finish in fact they are increasing with the increase in the birth rate.

The community meetings also included the relatives (mainly grand parents) who accompanied some of the children and the local teachers and schools who explained that those children miss a lot of their education because of their heart problems

#### How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

The focus group were the parents of children with heart defects who were seeking medical help by attending the hospitals on waiting lists waiting for dates for interventions.

Also the focus group are the doctors and nurses who want to treat their patients and learn how to follow them up. The local doctors and nurses expressed their need for FURTHER training and showed great interest in the training that will accompany the missions especially those in remote upper Egypt.

#### How were community members involved in planning the project?

The families expressed their urgent need for such interventions for their sick children The junior doctors and nurses also demanded training for better care of their patients
