## **Executive Summary**

The Power of Love Foundation (POL) would like to thank District 5340 and the SDDB Rotary Club for grant #P 60 in the amount of \$6,000 to partially support Power of Love Foundation's Pediatric HIV/AIDS care program in the Matero compound, in Lusaka, Zambia. With these grant funds, we have been able to provide:

1. Food (beans and mealie meal) to 148 HIV positive children for 6 months
2. Medicines for 148 HIV positive children for 6 months, and
3. Two hundred long lasting insecticide treated nets, and education on prevention of malaria to women and children vulnerable to malaria in Zambia.

Power of Love Foundation (POL) runs three programs in Zambia: the pediatric HIV/AIDS or Arms Reach Care (ARC) program, the Micro-Finance (MF) program and Project Mosquito Nets (PMN). All three programs are implemented by the Matero Care Center which is a low capital and operating cost community care center. The entire staff of the Matero Care Center is from the community of Matero, and the center is physically located within the community for easy access. Program activities are carried out in the Matero compound in Lusaka, and Kapiri-Mposhi (a rural area) in Zambia.

In summary, the Arms Reach Care Pediatric AIDS program (ARC), Micro loans, Project Mosquito Nets programs have increased survival rates of children in the Matero compound in Lusaka, Zambia and significantly improved the quality of life of their families. The program is comprehensive as it takes care of physical (food, medicines, malaria bed nets, training provided to caregivers), social (education, cultural), and psychological (counselling, peer groups) needs of the women and children. In addition, education on adherence to the ARV regimen and monitoring has reduced the number of children who might have developed resistance to drugs at an early age, leading to an increase in their life span. Further, the provision of micro loans program has gone a long way in making the women and their families self-reliant.

The Power of Love program has matured and our focus through 2012 continues to be provision of continuous quality care to the children, micro loans to their caregivers, and provision of mosquito nets and education on prevention of Malaria. The different components of our program have made our program sustainable and we are seeing a long term systemic change in the community.

## **About the Power of Love Foundation (POL)**

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At POL, we believe that the long term solution to the HIV/AIDS crisis lies with the local community and that empowering women and making them self-reliant is a key

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component in solving the global HIV/AIDS crisis. POL empowers women (many of them grandmothers caring for multiple orphaned grandchildren) and makes them self-reliant through the following multi-pronged approach: (1) by providing food, medicines and a package of health care services to children, (2) by training mothers/grandmother/extended family caregivers in caring for their HIV infected children and orphans, (3) by providing them with micro loans and business training to start a small business, and (4) by providing long lasting insecticide treated nets to children and families vulnerable to Malaria. As a result of this comprehensive approach, over the last six years we have had a total of 268 children in our program and have lost 10 children to AIDS. Statistically, we could have lost 40 children or more as life expectancy of an HIV positive child is just five years at birth. More importantly most of the children are back in school.

#### Power of Love's Programs in Zambia

**Pediatric HIV/AIDS care Program:** At present there are 148 HIV positive children in POL's pediatric HIV/AIDS care program. This program provides food, medicines, and a package of life saving health care services to all children in our program. Older children who are aware of their status are provided with psychosocial counseling. Further, training in HIV/AIDS care is provided to care givers of children. **Micro Finance Program:** Power of Love's MF program, empowers women by making them economically independent and with regular earnings they are able to have a better diet and keep their children in school. Traditionally, micro-finance has not been used to fight the AIDS epidemic (due to loan-grantee mortality, orphan care, and single/no adult households etc.). We tailored the traditional micro-finance model to suit the HIV/AIDS environment in Sub-Saharan Africa. The program is a success by every metric (repayment rates are consistently in the range of 90-92%) traditionally used in evaluating micro-finance ventures. The MF program complements the pediatric HIV/AIDS care program so that we are seeing a long term impact in the community. In 2011, Power of Love provided 50 new loans and business training to women caregivers (bringing the number of active loans to 165 to date). As a result of these loans that provide regular earnings to the family, nutrition and diet of the women and their families has improved, most of the children are back in school due to better health, and loan recipients have become role models in their

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community for both men and women. This program has benefitted more than 425 women directly and an additional 3200 people indirectly (assuming 8 people on average in a household).

**Project Mosquito Nets (PMN):** Power of Love's PMN was launched in Zambia in April 2010. To date more than 3800 long lasting mosquito nets have been distributed in one urban area and one rural area in Zambia. In 2011, we were able to provide 2000 long lasting insecticide treated nets to women and children vulnerable to malaria in Zambia. 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**Use of Funds Provided by District Grant P 60**

Funds provided by District 5340 grant #P 60 were spent according to grant guidelines over the period July 2011 to January 2012. As a result of this grant we were able to provide:

1. Food (beans and mealie meal) to 148 HIV positive children in Zambia for 6 months. Mealie meal is a Zambian staple food and is made out of corn.
2. Medicines for 148 HIV positive children for 6 months
3. Two hundred long lasting insecticide treated nets to women and children vulnerable to malaria in Zambia.

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## **Annex 2 – Profile of Two Children Supported by Grant P 60 Provided by Rotary District 5340 and the SDDB Rotary Club**

### **Henry Milanzi**



Henry is a 6 year old boy. Henry and his two younger brothers live with their grandmother as their parents are separated. All 3 boys are HIV positive and are enrolled in Power of Love's pediatric HIV/AIDS care program. The whereabouts of Henry's father are not known, and his mother is believed to be staying with friends but not interested in caring for her children.

Before Henry was enrolled in the program, he used to suffer from diarrhea, coughing, oral thrush and skin rash and was in and out of hospital. After trying several private clinics and traditional healers, his grandmother brought him to our clinic. Henry was counseled and tested HIV positive on 13<sup>th</sup> November 2011 and started taking ARVS on 20<sup>th</sup> December 2011. His health is better and he has started attending school. Henry is in grade two and likes school.

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**Martha Ngoma**



Martha is 9 months old and the youngest in a family of six. Both her parents are HIV positive and on ARVs. Martha tested HIV positive and is on Nevirapine and Septrin for another few months, when she will undergo a second test and if positive will be put on first line ARVs. Martha's mom knew of our program since 2008 when she had her twins tested for HIV at our clinic. When Martha was 3 months old she was admitted to the hospital twice after suffering from pneumonia and this prompted her mother to get her tested for HIV. When Martha tested positive, her mom enrolled her in Power of Love's program in 2011. Martha's mom enrolled Martha as she was very happy with the services provided to her twins in 2008. In her words, "I was very happy for the services that you provided to my twins until when you removed them from the program". When asked what services she said, "My twins were malnourished; you provided the nutritional support and medication. I was very surprised when the twins tested negative because I was very convinced that they would be positive." When asked what additional services can be provided by Power of Love, she said, "What I am asking is for this organization to extend these services to most mothers because when I go to the clinic I see how my fellow women are suffering and I just pray that the support may continue from the people who are supporting Power of Love.

At present Martha's health is improving and we are looking forward to the results of the second test (when she may test negative for HIV).
